AIC Institute Graduates were recognized individually.




Awards were given out. Jane Grove, last year's recipient of the Arthur R. Himsel Award (highest honor by AIC) announced this year's winner.

Joint Trades Panel on Fraud or Impersonations

American Land Title Association (ALTA) is gathering statistics nationally on different types of fraud.

AARP Fraud Watch Network is a free resource with podcasts and information in Spanish on proactively spotting scams and help if you're a victim. Local office in every state.

National Association of Realtors has videos about <u>avoiding wire fraud in transactions</u> and <u>avoiding vacant land</u> scams.

<u>ic3.gov</u> FBI crime reporting site. Also, use local FBI offices to verify foreign IDs.

Vetting for e-recordings

Reputable e-recording partners do a vetting process for new customers that includes:

- Validate SOS, State Bar (good standing),
 Second look at individuals
- Verify Is there an internet presence, own website, verify address and phone number match information given
- Bank account verification
- 3rd Party entity verification
- Search Google search Address and Name
- Demonstrable Recording Need what types of docs, samples





AI - types and uses

Do you use SIRI or Alexa? How about facial login on your smartphone? Then you're using Al.

You can use AI to create a speech, analyze huge amounts of data quickly, create custom artwork and videos.
Self-driving/parking cars use AI.

Al is being used in real estate for predictive analysis based on trends and other variables. It can also be used to give insight into buyer/seller preferences.

There are many practical purposes for the use of AI, but you should also be aware of the different types and their limitations.

There's narrow AI, general AI, machine learning...all the way up to self-aware machines. Search online for more info.

Reminder about IC 5-15-6-8

Reckless, knowing, or intentional destruction or damage to public records; offense; exception

Sec. 8. A public official or other person who recklessly, knowingly, or intentionally destroys or damages any public record commits a Level 6 felony unless:

- (1) the commission shall have given its approval in writing that the public records may be destroyed;
- (2) the commission shall have entered its approval for destruction of the public records on its own minutes; or
- (3) authority for destruction of the records is granted by an approved retention schedule established under this chapter. Formerly: Acts 1939, c.91, s.8. As amended by P.L.50-1991, SEC.17; P.L.158-2013, SEC.79.

Interesting Facts

Randolph County

- Randolph County, Indiana, was created in 1818. Named after old Randolph County in North Carolina, as many settlers had moved westward from the Carolinas.
- Its early history is distinguished by its embrace of abolitionism. Union Literary Institute, a racially-integrated school, was established in 1845. The county was home to three distinct settlements of free African-Americans, and numerous pieces of documentary evidence exist to that show that the county was an important part of the Underground Railroad.

Lake County

- Originally inhabited by the Potawatomi and generations of indigenous ancestors. Established by European Americans on Feb. 16, 1837.
- Statewide, Lake County ranks 2nd in total population out of the 92 Counties in Indiana.

Bartholomew County

- Bartholomew County was formed on February 12, 1821, and was named for Lt. Col. Joseph Bartholomew, wounded at the Battle of Tippecanoe.
- In 1942, Camp Atterbury was created to support WWII. Named after William Wallace Atterbury, who received a Distinguished Service Medal during WWI.

Sullivan County

- In 1815, Carlisle was founded. State legislature created Sullivan County in December 30, 1816. Named for Daniel Sullivan, reputed to be a Revolutionary War general killed by Native Americans while carrying a dispatch between Fort Vincennes and Louisville.
- Pioneer heroine of abdominal surgery Jane Todd is buried in Sullivan County. Born in Virginia in 1763.

Adams County

- The creation of this county was passed on February 7, 1835. Its name honors the sixth President, John Quincy Adams.
- The Amish community in Adams County belongs to the Swiss Amish, an Amish affiliation whose ancestors came to Adams County in 1840 and who speak a Bernese dialect in everyday life.

Hendricks County

- In December 1823, Hendricks County was introduced in the Senate and was signed by Indiana Governor William Hendricks, in whose honor the new county was named.
- Transportation has played a vital role in Hendricks County. For example, in 1876 one rail line connected Plainfield to seven other Hendricks County towns and to Indianapolis and Terre Haute.

Community Outreach

Hamilton County - Christmas families

All the offices in the building sponsor a family or two at Christmas time. Each office selects a school district and gets a family from the Youth Assistance Organization. Fundraisers during the year (bake sales, silent auctions) raise funds to purchase a holiday meal and gifts. Our staff enjoys dividing up family members and buying/wrapping gifts. Noblesville Youth Assistance group delivers the items.



St. Joseph County - Christmas scarves

Sharon Banicki, Fiscal Clerk of the St. Joseph Recorder's Office, works with a group called Sew Loved. This group teaches women and girls to sew, quilt and mend with all machines, fabric, scissors and tools available at no cost to the participants. She also participates in a local event called "Community Santa." Each year, this event gives toys and gifts to children in the community that might not have a Christmas otherwise. Sharon knits, crochets and sews scarves for the children. Last year, Sharon made approximately 150 scarves, but this year she hopes to make 400, which is about the number of children that participate in the event. Sharon says, "My goal is that every child leaves the event with a scarf."

Ever been subpoenaed?



Misty Coleman (left), Pike County Recorder and Molly O'Connor in Jefferson County have both been subpoenaed.

Misty was subpoended in a land dispute between individuals. The case was worked out that day & no further action was taken.

Recorder Molly O'Connor was subpoended and testified in criminal court. The case involved land records, a trust and a frequent visitor to the Jefferson County Recorder's Office.

Harve Hensley wanted to record deeds he signed as "trustee" without processing them through the Assessor and Auditor offices. Molly stated that she had earlier recorded a Certificate of Trust for him which she faults herself for doing. As a Recorder, this writer knows that we are often presented with peculiar documents with which we are not familiar and recommended to err in favor of the customer to "record as presented."

Molly advised him that it wasn't possible to record deeds without passing them through the other offices saying that he made several attempts and was always polite with her. She acknowledged handling him politely and professionally.

There had been an actual Trust overseen by a brother. Harve made the error of entering into a contract for services to the property with an individual when he did not have that authority. That is how Molly found herself testifying in court about deeds. She hopes this will help keep other Recorders from having a similar experience. Harve had to serve time in jail for his errors.

You can read about the curious experiences of Harve in Odyssey Case Management System, <u>Case Search - MyCase (in.gov)</u>, Bronson Hensley, Sr. 39C01-1712-EU-000080, looks like the beginning of the saga. It appears there are two more cases involving the Estate/Trust. There are an additional four criminal cases. This year is the last of Molly's second term.
